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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

Established in 1959, Basanti Devi College is an accredited and Government sponsored institution, affiliated to the University of Calcutta. The College is named after the wife of Chittaranjan Das, Basanti Devi, who was the first lady freedom fighter of Bengal to be imprisoned by the British. It has a prime location, connected both to the suburbs and other parts of the city through the railway and metro stations nearby.

The College has a long history of imparting quality education to women students irrespective of their caste, creed and religion. It offers 16 Undergraduate programmes, of which 13 are of Honours level, and two Postgraduate programmes along with 51 Certificate/Add-on/Value-added courses during the assessment period.

To make the teaching-learning process at par with the latest developments in the sphere, the College has consistently augmented the infrastructure. The ICT enabled classrooms, Learning Management System(LMS), well-resourced laboratories, a fully resourced Central Library, a well-equipped Auditorium and Wi-Fi enabled campus with CCTV surveillance define the teaching-learning outcome of the College.

The college has a Research Development Committee(RDC). 36 faculty members are already doctorates; by 2030 the college envisions a teaching faculty where all are doctorates. Many faculty members are engaged in teaching in different universities as resource persons. Some faculty members are on the editorial board(s) of several referee journals of repute. Two teachers have joined other universities. The College has extension facilities like Netaji Subhas Open University(NSOU) Study Centre offering more learning options.

Gender equity norms are strictly followed in the different arenas of institutional activities. Female members have been inducted in the traditionally male-dominated non-teaching staff while there are male teachers in what was purely a female teaching community. The College ensures that healthy working relations exist among the staff members through its Code of Conduct and other means. Accordingly, the vision of the college is to impart an all-round quality education to its students.

Giving prime importance to foster innovative ecosystem, the College has established **Entrepreneurship Development Cell** and the Institution's **Innovation Council (IIC)**.

Students actively participate in the Annual Sports. In January 2019 the College hosted the **INTER COLLEGE STATE SPORTS AND GAMES CHAMPIONSHIP**, **2018-19**, both state and district levels, organized by the Education Directorate, Government of West Bengal. Through the varied activities of NSS and NCC units of the College, students are sensitized to diverse societal needs and citizenship values thereby forming an enduring bond between the academic community and the society at large.

- More seminars and workshops on research methodology and entrepreneurship can be arranged.

Institutional Challenge

- Declining student-enrolment ratio as students and guardians prefer professional to traditional education.
- Lack of interest among students towards higher studies including research programme.
- The institution is seriously scouting for land to set up a second campus to start new courses and begin P.G courses in some subjects.

1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

Basanti Devi College ,Kolkata affiliated to University of Calcutta follows the curriculum and syllabus designed by the University for 16 Under Graduate programmes and 2 Post Graduate programmes. The college has its own institutional level mechanism for the effective planning and delivery of the curriculum in adherence to the University regulations.

- IQAC ensures efficient curriculum planning and delivery process through a well-documented procedure
 which includes the University academic calendar, the Annual Academic Calendar of the College,
 Prospectus, Department academic plans, course plan, Outcome Based Education, exit survey, result
 analysis, parents teachers meetings, online students feedback system and other stakeholders feedback
 on curriculum, academic performance and ambience.
- The College has ensured effective curriculum planning by designing **51 add-on/certificate and value-added programmes** delivered through a well-planned and documented process in the last five years. More than **3500 students have enrolled and completed** such courses during that period.
- Programme Outcome (PO), Programme Specific Outcome (PSO) and Course Outcome (CO) are prepared and displayed on the College Website.
- Student-centric teaching-learning ecosystem is ensured by proper delivery of course plan and outcomes to students through induction programmes, experiential learning strategies, ICT tools and Learning Management System (LMS).
- The institution adopts Inclusive and Exclusive Approach towards imparting knowledge, concentrating on Professional Ethics, Human Values and other cross cutting issues like Gender Sensitization and Environmental Sustainability.
- Well-equipped Science, Computer and Language laboratories along with automated college library services complement curriculum delivery.
- Based on the performance in Continuous Internal Assessment, students are assessed and special programmes like **Remedial Classes**, **Peer tutoring** are conducted for the benefit of the students.
- **Teachers** also attend the Curriculum Revision and Course Design workshops conducted by the University and **play a proactive role in the Syllabus Restructuring process**. They are members of important University bodies such as **Board of Studies**, **Faculty**, etc.
- Students are encouraged to enroll themselves in NSS, NCC, Electoral Literacy Club(ELC) etc. to make them responsible citizens.
- Online Feedback is collected systematically from the stakeholders; after analysis the reports are communicated for internal decision-making and made available on the institutional website. Relevant inputs regarding syllabi are also conveyed to the University Board of Studies.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

Basanti Devi College seeks to empower young women through holistic education. To realize this vision, the institute consistently forefronts its teaching, learning, and evaluation processes, aligning them with the HEI's vision.

- The Institution has an interactive website which gives the details of admission procedures and courses offered. Admission to courses are done as per the norms prescribed by the University and instructions received from the government to ensure an equitable representation of students from all sections of the society.
- The institution cultivates a **student-centric learning environment**, integrating diverse methodologies such as experiential learning, participative engagement, and problem-solving.

- Student Profile Mapping help to assess the general quotient (gq) & empowering quotient (eq) of each student and thus help to identify advance and slow learners.
- Tutorial/Remedial classes are conducted for the slow learners and Advance learners are encouraged to attend conferences, workshops and appear for paper presentations.
- The COVID -19 pandemic has inadvertently built up our online teaching skills, each of our faculty members have their own dedicated Google classroom through which class notes and assignments are sent to students to supplement the chalk and talk teaching.
- The institute consistently endeavours to appoint highly proficient teachers against sanctioned post and 92% of sanctioned seats are filled, maintaining a student-teacher ratio of 1:17.
- 75.61% of the teaching staff possesses qualifications like PhD/NET/SET.
- The Institution facilitates **Wi-Fi connectivity** for the students as well as faculty members.
- Educational Excursions (Industrial Visit), Field trips, Exhibition for enhancement of knowledge
- The attainment of learning outcomes (POs and COs) are evaluated and analysed using direct and indirect methods. Direct methods involve in-semester assessments, while indirect methods incorporate course exit surveys.
- Conduction of university examinations like collection of fees, registering process (ERS), IMES (Internal Mark Entry) and declaration of results are done through an online process. Grievances faced by the students are addressed immediately by the Examination committee.
- The institute's vigilant oversight and meticulously structured approach contribute to an equitable teaching, learning, and evaluation process. This commitment is underscored by the pass percentage of **80.08**%.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college has well-defined Policy documents to define Research, extension and collaboration.

- 36 teachers have doctorates and several others are at various stages of completion.
- Teachers publish articles in journals and have authored textbooks.
- The College organises Seminars/Workshops on Research Methodology, Intellectual Property Rights and Entrepreneurship.
- Socially relevant extension work, along with innovative research activities has always been a priority in Basanti Devi College.
- Collaborations with reputed institutions inside and out of India testify to the research activities of our learned faculty members.
- The **well-equipped research laboratory** formerly sponsored by the Department of Science and Technology(DST), Government of India, serves as a Research Centre.
- The college was a recognized host institute of Indian National Centre for Ocean Information Services(INCOIS), an autonomous body under the Ministry of Earth Science, Government of India.

- The college also has a meticulously planned **Research Development Committee (RDC)** and a dedicated ICT research centre.
- Furnished with well-equipped Laboratories and well stocked Libraries, both Central and Seminar, the college has an ambience conducive to research. This is reflected by the quantity and quality of scholarly work submitted and published in the college research journal "Academia: Basanti Devi College".
- The institute has more than **20 MoU(s)** including one MoU with University.
- Under the purview of National Service Scheme (NSS), National Cadet Corps (NCC) and Rotaract Club, many outreach programs are undertaken and these benefit the economically deprived communities surrounding our college.

Infrastructure and Learning Resources

- The institution has 28 classrooms (the modes of teaching being conventional Chalk & Talk and Digital),1 auditorium with 200 person arrangement with hi-end digital projector wi-fi enabled and A&V system, 2 galleryroomsaccommodating150students each with short-throw digital projectors and A&V system,1 smart classroom with an interactive digital board, computer, PA system with Wi-Fi, 8 ICT-enabled classroom with portable projectors, and 77 computers out of which 62 are used by student & faculties and 15 for administrative use only.
- The Library has INFLIBNET, NDL, computer and internet facilities for students and teachers.
- Laboratory Facilities:
- The Chemistry Laboratory includes Qualitative and Quantitative laboratories; Instruments, Preparation and Store Rooms, with a maximum student capacity of 50.
- The Physics Laboratory comprises General, Electrical, Electronics, Dark Room, and Computational laboratories with multiple computers and teaching resources.
- **ThePsychology Laboratory** trains students for practical experiments and psychometric testing on human memory, attention, etc. with SFRM software & Tachistoscope.
- The Language Laboratory has a computer and accessories, headphones and speakers to teach communication skills.
- The NumericalLaboratory has 15 computers with software installed (C Compiler, Oracle, Visual Basic, and Linux & Unix OS).
- The Statistics Department has installed Minitab 18 Academic user.

• Sports & Yoga Facilities:

The college has a sports room with gym equipment, indoor and Ooutdoor game equipment (Table Tennis, Carom, Chessboard, Badminton and Volleyball), a small area to train students for Kho-Kho, Kabaddi, etc.Regular Yoga sessions are held for everyone.

Bills, vouchers and registers are maintained through ledger, cashbooks and Tally software inour **Office**, which isequipped with computers.

Annual cultural programmes, Saraswati Puja, NCC and NSS activities are performed on the **Open Air Stage**.

- A computer training centre run by **WEBEL** provides basic computer training to students.
- Our college has 15.5 KVA Solar Power panels, a 16.5 KVA generator, 16 CCTV cameras, Wi-Fi

Access Points, Intercom with 16 nodes, water coolers, vending machines, fire extinguishers etc.

Student Support and Progression

- The College offers Government and Non-Government Scholarships and other forms of financial assistance to economically weak students.
- During the last five years a large percentage of students have availed of these.
- Students received certificates after completion of German Basic Communicative Language and Spoken English in the Prize Distribution Ceremony in 2023.
- The Medical Unit of the College conducts weekly health checkup of students and staff.
- DuringCovid-19 the institution arranged vaccination camps for students and staff. The vaccine drive was very successful.
- The College Computer Training Centre conducted by WBEIDC Ltd trains students and staff.
- The Internal Complaints Committee (IC) addresses issues of sexual harassment in the college campus.
- Many students have benefited from the career counseling sessions organized by the College Placement Cell.
- Students participate in annual competitions, college socials, and inter-college competitions.
- Inter-College State Sports and Games Championship, 2018-19 at the district level in the of Footballfor men, Atheletics for men & women and Kho-Kho for women was hosted by the college. The South Calcutta district level sports meet 2019 was held from 28th -30th January, 2019.
- Freshers' welcome to new students and farewell to students who have passed out of college.
- The Alumni Association of Basanti Devi College, CHIRANTANI, was registered on 28th March, 2017 by the Principal Prof (Dr). Indrila Guha. It had been officially launched on 7th December, 2002 as PRAKTANIKA by the erstwhile Principal Dr. Bijayalakshmi Mukherjee.

Governance, Leadership and Management

- The Vision and Mission of the College to empower young women through holistic education is attained through clear governance; participative management and stakeholder support.
- Inclusion of teaching and non-teaching staff and students as members of all the committees/cells together with the five statutory bodies, Committee for SC/ST, Minority and OBC Cells, Grievance Redressal Committee, Internal Complaints Committee and the Anti-Ragging Committee ensures

decentralization in decision-making.

- To enhance governance, the HEI implemented e-governance in planning and administration, admissions, examinations, student activities, and finance, promoting transparency, participation, and accountability.
- More than 50 % faculty members attended online or face-to-face Faculty Development Programs (FDPs).
- More than 20% faculty members were provided financial support for attending conferences & workshops.
- Organized more than 50 IQAC quality initiatives, including administrative and professional development programs for teaching and non-teaching staff, training programmes and welfare programmes during the assessment period.
- A performance review system of the staff forms a part of the institutional culture. Feedback from various stakeholders ensures quality appraisal, enhancement and professional competency. The curriculum transaction is made effective through inculcating life skills like Yoga, Physical fitness, health & hygiene, Self- Defense, Aerobics, Soft skills like communication, cooperation, team work, time management, resilience, empathy & computing skills like Micro soft office, Power Point presentation etc. • The college also runs skilled based short-term courses on Functional English, Adjustments skills, Aptitude Skills, Interview skills, Employability Skills, Entrepreneurial Skills etc.

4. Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course):

• The college offers programmes on Sanskrit, one of the oldest languages in the world & a language that showcases rich literary and cultural heritage of India. The Department of Sanskrit organized certificate course on Spoken Sanskrit &also conducted online workshop on Communicative Sanskrit for students and faculty members. • The Undergraduate CBCS syllabus incorporates papers on Ancient and Modern Indian History incorporates papers on Ancient and Modern Indian History, Political Thought, Education System, Classical and Modern Indian Literature, Indian Philosophy etc. to instill a sense of rootedness and pride among the students regarding rich traditions of Indian knowledge system. • The use of Bengali language as a major mode of communication in the classroom enables the learners to understand the topics clearly. Bengali is the mother tongue of majority of our students. Most of our students write their University Examination papers in Bengali/ English. • To imbibe Indian art and Culture, College celebrates important days, organizes various cultural activities, Annual Cultural Competition, Annual Social for students where preference is given to Indian Culture and Traditions. • Guest Lectures, Seminars, Workshops and Competitions are organized by the Language Departments to foster the spirit of Language and Culture.

5. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

• The College took proactive measures in implementing Outcome Based Education to ensure student centric education with priority on skill and knowledge enhancement. • The outcomes of all programmes and courses are prepared by the faculty with the help of the Principal and Coordinator, IQAC & displayed on the college website and department notice boards. • Students of each Semester are made aware of the course outcomes, program specific

outcomes and Program outcomes by the faculty members. • Attainment of POs & Cos is evaluated by both direct & indirect method through students' performance in Internal Examinations, Tutorials, Final Semester University Examinations, Students Feedback & Student satisfaction Survey. • The outcome-based questions as per the Blooms Taxonomy are generated for each course by the faculty members for continuous internal evaluations (CIE) and are properly evaluated and mapped to CIE component of direct attainment. Based on the attainment analysis, corrective measures are adopted to reach the desirable outcomes.

6. Distance education/online education:

• Online/ distance education provides more possibilities in the education framework giving space to a synchronous learning mode; blended/ flipped classes etc. • Most of the classrooms and laboratories of the college are ICT enabled and faculty is welltrained in online education. • During the COVID-19 pandemic entire education was shifted to online mode and several options/ facilities for online education are made available in the college. College has utilized various online platforms like Google classroom and meet, College YouTube channel and college Learning Management System- for effective teaching learning process. • The college organizes various conferences and interaction with eminent academicians and scientists in online and hybrid mode for holistic development of students and teachers. • Students are given training during Library Orientation Programs and at regular intervals to access and utilize various e- resources including NLIST. • The college has Study centre of Netaji Subhas Open University (NSOU) which offers undergraduate & postgraduate courses through Distance mode. • Overall enrollment of students in NSOU study Centre of our college has significantly increased after COVID-19. Thus, the college is well prepared to reap the benefits of online education.

Institutional Initiatives for Electoral Literacy

Yes, the institution has established an Electoral Literacy Club(ELC)to raise awareness among students regarding their electoral rights and

familiarizing them with the procedures of voter registration and casting their votes. The primary objective of ELC is to disseminate electoral knowledge and awareness among the local community by utilising the expertise and capabilities of its members. Additionally, it aims to streamline the process of voter registration for individuals who are eligible but have not yet registered. It also arranges programmes like Slogan Writing Competition, Poster Painting Competition to raise awareness among the college community.

2. Whether students' co-ordinator and co-ordinating faculty members are appointed by the College and whether the ELCs are functional? Whether the ELCs are representative in character?

The ELC is active in the campus and the following faculty and students' representatives are appointed as office bearers: Faculty Coordinator – Dr. Ananya Mitra, Joint Faculty Coordinator- Arunima Bhattacharya, Student Representative - Moumi Chowdhury. The ELC is both functional and representative. The members hold meetings to discuss and debate upon relevant issues concerning electoral literacy. Apart from students and faculty members of the Political Science, both Undergraduate and Post-graduate, the membership of the club consists of students from diverse academic disciplines of the college.

3. What innovative programmes and initiatives undertaken by the ELCs? These may include voluntary contribution by the students in electoral processes-participation in voter registration of students and communities where they come from, assisting district election administration in conduct of poll, voter awareness campaigns, promotion of ethical voting, enhancing participation of the under privileged sections of society especially transgender, commercial sex workers, disabled persons, senior citizens, etc.

The College ELC has engaged in several activities, such as conducting classes to raise awareness about elections, organising camps to facilitate the registration of new voters, assisting students and their family members to link their electoral identification with their Aadhar card, and celebrating National Voters Day along with a pledge taking ceremony. The College teaching and non-teaching staff members consistently fulfil the roles of Presiding Officers and Polling Officers during Elections. The College premises are utilised for election-related operations.

 faculty members according to their areas of specialisation and proficiency.
- Faculty of every department prepare a detailed month-wise teaching plan according to the syllabus prescribed by the affiliating University and upload it on the Learning Management System(LMS) of the college for students.
- Programme Outcome(PO), Programme Specific Outcome (PSO) and Course Outcome(CO) are prepared and displayed on college website.
- Certificate and Value-added courses are designed at the beginning of the year.

Cross-cutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment, and Sustainability have been incorporated by the affiliating university in the curriculum to make the student sensitive, responsive, and accountable to value different perspectives of life. Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, and Environment and Sustainability are highly valued by the college since they are closely linked to its vision, mission, and core values.

Professional Ethics:

Professional Ethics are vital for sustainable growth in one's career. The college offers 104 courses, including History of Bengali Literature, Outlines of Sanskrit, English and Hindi Literature, Modern Bengali Poetry, Media and Communication Studies, Business Communication, Academic Writing and Composition, Communicative English, Film and Literature, Economic Sociology, Population Studies, Sociology of Work and Industry, Life Span Development, Managing Stress, Developing Emotional Competence, Technology in Education, Inclusive Education, Women and Society, Women's Rights and Politics, Mental Health and Basic Helping Skills, Skill for Democratic Citizenship which impart professional ethics and mold students to become ethically strong professionals in the future. Various programs are conducted on Intellectual Property Rights, Research Methodology, Entrepreneurship, and Personality Development.

Gender:

In order to have a clear understanding of women as a gender, their rights, responsibilities, roles, needs, health, and holistic development, the college offers 37 courses which focus on different perspectives of women. Some of the courses which focus on Gender are Gender Issues in India, Gender and Law, Gender and Media, Gender and Empowerment, Community Development and Gender, Gender and Social Work, Sociology of Gender and Sexuality, Elizabethan and Jacobean Drama, The Victorian Era, Women Education. The College offers Women's Studies as a B.A. general Undergraduate Program under CBCS. Seminars, workshops, and awareness programs on gender issues are organized by various Departments to foster gender sensitivity. The college has a Gender Equality Policy & has conducted a Gender Audit.

Human Values:

A Certificate Programme on Value Education is offered to 1st Semester Undergraduate Students. It encourages the students to revive their values and keeps themselves spirited. There are 50 courses which impart Human Values including Developmental Psychology, Human Resource Management, Value & Peace Education, Value of social service on public health, Peace Movement in India, Democratic values & Domestic Harmony, Ethics and Cultural History of India. - Laboratory teaching and practical demonstrations help students grasp scientific processes effectively.
- Students undergo internships in diverse industries and institutions, sharing their experiences with their peers in class.
- Distinguished academicians, research scholars, and entrepreneurs are invited to deliver lectures and participate in panel discussions, enriching students' learning experiences.
- Students engage in activities like extempore speeches, debates, and quizzes during intra-college events such as Hullor. Honours departments organize additional activities like quizzes, paper presentations, and extempore speeches on selected themes from the syllabus.
- Students participate in inter-college competitions organized by government and non-government organizations, achieving notable success.

Participative Learning

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1

Mechanism of internal/ external assessment is transparent and the grievance redressal system is time-bound and efficient

Response:

- 1. Basanti Devi College has developed a transparent and robust mechanism of internal/ external assessment and the grievance redressal system is time bound and efficient.
- 2. The College is affiliated to the University of Calcutta and is guided by the regulations framed by the University regarding examinations and evaluations.
- 3. The CBCS pattern has been introduced by the University for undergraduate and post graduate courses from the academic session 2018-19. As per this pattern, the University Examination system is two-fold consisting of Internal Assessment including Tutorial Assignments and the external End-semester Examination.
- 4. In the orientation programmes, the students are made aware about the CBCS structure and the evaluation process and all information related to the examinations and evaluation related notifications published by the affiliating University for students, teachers and administrators are regularly uploaded on the College website.
- 5. Like all the colleges affiliated to the University of Calcutta, the College acts as an Examination Centre to conduct the End-semester Examinations. For this purpose, the college has separate examination committees for each year, i.e. two semesters. These committees are entrusted with the responsibility of conducting the University End-semester examinations and of ensuring redressal of any exam related grievances.
- 6. The internal assessments are conducted by the departments concerned, usually during the middle of each semester. As per directions from the University the dates of such examinations are finalized and notified to the students well ahead.
- 7. Tutorial examinations are conducted following the guidelines of the University, comprising of term papers, projects, home assignments, written test, MCQ test, viva-voce, group discussions, paper presentation etc.
- 8. Students are allowed to appear in the semester end examination provided they have attended at least 75% classes for each course. Monthly class attendance of students, which is a part of internal assessment, is calculated by the departments and intimated to the students.
- 9. Adequate concession is given in attendance of students on medical grounds and for participation in extracurricular activities.
- 10. If a student is not able to appear for internal assessment or tutorial (internal examination) due to medical or any other valid reason, internal examination is conducted for that student as per norms, provided that she submits application with proper documents.
- 11. In addition, the departments also arrange regular class tests for evaluating the students' progress. To maintain transparency, the answer scripts of internal class tests are shown to the students and necessary suggestions are given by the faculty members to individual students so that they can do better in their University examinations. Remedial classes are also arranged for slow learners.
- 12. Parent-teacher meeting is organized by the departments in every semester to communicate to the parents about the progress of theirs wards and understand if any additional support is needed by any student in particular.
- 13. After publication of Semester-End University result, if any student is dissatisfied with her marks, she can apply for review of her answer script (RTI/PPR) through the College after publication of University Review notification.
- 14. During the COVID-19 pandemic, all examinations including End Semester Examinations were conducted by the institution with guidance from the affiliating University. The faculty members continuously tutored the students on how to submit their answer scripts through the LMS portal.

Outcome-Based Education (OBE) is a pedagogical approach that requires curriculum, pedagogy, and assessment processes to be restructured such that they better reflect the attainment of high-order learning rather than just the accrual of course credits. Through careful planning and execution, Basanti Devi College was successful in making a deliberate and planned transition to outcome-based education through systematic planning and execution.

Basanti Devi College offers 16 Undergraduate and 2 Post Graduate Programmes. Curriculum offered in the college is prescribed by the University of Calcutta. In strict compliance with the guidelines given by the UGC & University of Calcutta, the objectives of Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (COs) are framed by the faculty members under the guidance of the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC). The IQAC provided the training to the faculty of the college regarding the formulation of programme outcomes (POs), programme-specific outcomes (PSOs) and course outcomes (COs). All the departments outlined the COs of their respective disciplines . The IQAC formulated the Programme Outcomes for the UG (Honours) and PG programmes.

Program Outcomes (POs) and Course Outcomes (Cos) for all programmes are displayed on the college website and it can be accessed by all the stakeholders namely Faculty, Students, Alumni, Parents & Employers.

Communicating the POs and COs to the students

- POs and COs are outlined during the Common Orientation Programme and Departmental Orientation Programme respectively on the day of commencement of each academic session.
- POs and COs are displayed in the Departmental Notice Board
- Hard Copy of the syllabi and Learning Outcomes are available in the Seminar Library of

- the Department for ready reference.
- The syllabus displayed in the website with the POs and COs also enables a student to have an overview of the Course contents, gather reference materials for the text prescribed and prepare themselves for the course.
- Some direct and indirect methods are followed for evaluating attainment of POs/Cos .Program outcomes and Course Outcomes are mainly achieved through the curriculum delivery and assessment. IQAC has identified a set of assessment measures (Direct & Indirect) to monitor student progress in achieving the outcomes.

Summary of POs and COs:

The college offers a range of undergraduate programmes in Arts and Science which cover social behaviour and responsibilities, human values, creativity, linguistic skills, global culture, professional ethics, communication skill, financial knowledge, management, scientific temperament and environmental protection, conceptual understanding, analytical thinking and research attitude. The skill based Certificate/ value added courses are designed to equip students with skills and knowledge to cope with life's challenges.

Learning outcomes are framed on the basis of 6 levels of Revised Bloom's Taxonomy(2001).

Programme Outcomes (PO) and Course Outcomes (CO) are mainly achieved through the curriculum delivery and assessment. IQAC has identified a set of assessment measures, **direct and indirect**, to monitor student progress in achieving the outcomes.

Direct assessment Measures: Continuous Internal Assessment and University End Semester Examination

- Faculty members evaluate students on a continuous basis following the guidelines laid down by the University. Students' attendance is given due weightage along with class tests, viva voce, assignments, presentations, quizzes, MCQ tests etc.
- Attainment of POs and COs is evaluated on the basis of the performance of the students in

their University End Semester Examinations. A threshold of 45% to 60% was set up for Final Semester Students (depending upon the class performance of the students). Based on this threshold the attainment level of POs and COs is calculated as per the rubrics like 70% of students scoring above 50% - 1(low), 80% of students scoring above 50% - 2(medium), 90% of students scoring above 50% - 3(high).

- After publication of University End Semester results, all Heads of Departments along with the faculty members analyze the performance of the students and evaluate the attainment level of POs and COs.
- The college uses a **Web-portal for mapping of CO with PO** for all the Final semester students. The portal uses a well-defined Algorithm for computing the Attainment Score of each Student of the college based on both CGPA and the Faculty members' Grades.

Attainment Score = 80% of CGPA + 20% of Faculty given grade.

This score gives a robust idea regarding the Attainment levels and it is evaluated for each and every student passing out of the College.

Indirect Assessment Measures: Student Exit feedback and Students Progression to Higher Education and Job

- **Feedback form** is provided to each outgoing student in the form of questionnaire that facilitates improvement of the teaching learning process.
- Student progression record (opting for Higher Studies or Job) for each department reflects the course outcomes .

Response:

Research and innovation is deeply ingrained in the culture of Basanti Devi College. If we follow the SSR of Basanti Devi college of all the previous cycles we would find that our institution have been host to many innovative programs from the very beginning.

After the completion of the third cycle of NAAC accreditation, another noteworthy activity towards developing an aptitude of research and fostering academic excellence, is our very own academic research journal "Academia: Basanti Devi College" which has been in circulation from 2017 onwards. It is a **bilingual, multidisciplinary, peer –reviewed** journal which is published both as hard – copy (ISSN: 2581-8902) and in e-format (ISSN: 2583-2573) .Since its conception this magazine has been enriched with the academic contributions from bright researchers all over the country and abroad, along with inputs from our own learned colleagues and in exceptional cases even from students. We aim to have this journal, **UGC-CARE** enlisted by 2025.

Sustainable development and waste –management has always been a matter of keen concern for the college. In 2020 a research project was granted by the West Bengal Pollution control board to DrIndrila Guha and DrAditi Sarkar (Principal and Coordinator, IQAC) on **paper recycling.** The huge load of waste papers generated in the college ,in the form of discarded books ,checked answer scripts, official paper work ,used lab note books are processed through a specially procured machine and converted into paper pulp , which is then shaped into files, table mats and vases. This is exhibited and sold in our in house fairs conducted by the alumni association Chirantani . This total venture is aimed to develop sustainable entrepreneurial skills in our students in continuation to plastic waste management by re-cycling waste LDPE(discarded plastic carry bags which is a major pollutant) as mentioned in the SSR submitted in 2017 .

The major activities and achievements under Basanti Devi College Institution's Innovation Council (IIC) include Food Fiesta, cooking of healthy organic foods and selling them by Human Rights, Workshop on soap making by the chemistry department, Create different recycled products out of the waste papers and fabric painting an NSS & IQAC initiative in collaboration with Pidilite.

Institution has created an ecosystem for innovations, **Indian Knowledge System (IKS)**, ,including awareness about IPR, establishment of IPR cell and Incubation centre. **Intellectual Property Right Cell** organized one programme on IPR in association with NIPAM, Govt. of India. The college offers programmes on Sanskrit, one of the oldest languages in the world and a language that showcases rich literary and cultural heritage of India. The Department of Sanskrit organized certificate course on Spoken Sanskrit and also conducted online workshop on Communicative Sanskrit

Teaching -Learning Equipment in Classrooms:

Theinstitutionhas 28 fully functional classrooms, 7 laptops, 64 computers for student and faculty use only. The modes of teaching are conventional Chalk & Talk and Digital.

Digital and ICT-enabled Classrooms:

- Two gallery rooms with a capacity of 150 students each equipped with short-throw digital projectors and A&V system.
- One smart classroom with a high-end interactive digital board, desktop computer, PA system with Wi-Fi facility.
- Total 8 ICT-enabled classrooms equipped with portable projectors for conducting classes, seminars &presentations.
- INFLIBNET/ NLIST & NDL facilities for students and teachers
- Computer and internet facilities for students inside the library

Laboratory Facilities:

• The Science Departments (Physics, Chemistry, and Computer Science), Psychology and Communicative English have well equipped laboratories along with computer and internet facilities.

The Chemistry Laboratory Infrastructure:

- The Chemistry laboratory includes Qualitative and Quantitative laboratories; Instruments, Preparation and Store Rooms, with a maximum student capacity of 50.
- Each laboratory has gas and distilled water connection and fire extinguishers.

The Physics Laboratory Infrastructure:

- The Physics laboratory comprises General, Electrical, Electronics and Computer laboratories, and Dark Room.
- The air-conditioned Computational laboratory accommodates 20 students, featuring multiple computers and teaching resources. Regular upgrades are done for student benefit.

The Psychology Laboratory Infrastructure:

- The Psychology laboratory trains students to conduct practical experiments and psychometric testing on human memory, attention, emotion etc.
- There are a number of apparatuses at the laboratory (SFRM software, Tachistoscope & computers).

The Language and Communicative English Laboratory has a computer and accessories, and a set-up for 20 students with headphones and speakers to learn and study communication skills.

The Numerical Laboratory has 17 computers with software installed, such as C Compiler, Oracle, Visual Basic, and Linux & Unix OS.

The Statistics Department has installed Minitab 18 Academic user.

Sports & Yoga Facilities:

- A sports room with gym equipment
- Indoor and Outdoor game equipment (Table Tennis, Carom, Chessboard, Badminton and Volleyball).
- A small area on the campus used to train our students for team sports (Kho-Kho, Kabaddi).
- A well-equipped digital room used for special purposes (lectures on physical fitness awareness, celebration of International Yoga Day) and regular Yoga sessions held for all.

Webel Training Centre:

• The college has a computer training centre run by WEBEL, which provides basic level computer training to students at a subsidized rate.

Office Facilities:

- Equipped with computers, our office keeps all information in both hard copies and computers. Bills, vouchers and registers are maintained as needed.
- The fully air-conditioned office has one multifunctional photocopier machine for students (paid)and faculties.
- Books of accounts are kept through ledger, cashbooks and Tally software.

The Open Air Stage caters to myriad cultural needs of the students. Annual cultural programmes,

Saraswati Puja, NCC and NSS activities are performed on the stage.

Other Supporting Facilities:

- 15.5 KVA Solar Power panels to generate electricity from renewable energy source.
- A 16.5 KVA generator for uninterrupted power supply during electrical failure
- 16 CCTV cameras with monitoring system
- Intercom with 16 nodes
- Wi-Fi Access Points well distributed throughout the campus for wide access to internet connectivity

4.2 Library as a Learning Resource

4.2.1

Library is automated with digital facilities using Integrated Library Management System (ILMS), adequate subscriptions to e-resources and journals are made. The library is optimally used by the faculty and students

Response:

- Our college library, located on the first floor of the college building, is almost fully automated (2017) through integrated library management system software KOHA (Version 21.05.13, 000). The college library contains a rich collection of more than 30,480 textbooks & reference books, 4 daily newspapers, 3 employment-oriented newspapers & 13 peer-reviewed journals, e-books and e-journals and magazines and maps.
- Library resources are developed by purchase and donation. The total number of books donated to the library till the year 2023 is 1761. And, to be more specific, 607 books were donated between 2018 and 2023. These books were sourced from varied publishers, ex-students, teachers, and authors themselves.
- Ours is the first college in West Bengal and under the University of Calcutta to have received UGC-INFLIBNET NLIST Connectivity for Electronic Library. The college has subscribed to 4000+ e-journals and 100000+ e-books through N-List Connectivity. Library membership is compulsory & open-access facilities are available. Cloud-based Online Public Access Catalogue (OPAC) has been hosted. The National Digital Library (NDL) facility is accessible to teachers and students alike. A good number of users (both faculties and students) are using the library every day (both physically and via e-Access).
- Our library is fully internet connected and Wi-Fi enabled. The library is also under CCTV surveillance and air-conditioned. The library provides photocopy and internet browsing facilities as well. Dusting and Pest control are done on a regular basis. Our Central Library offers an 'Earn While You Learn Scheme (EWL)' for the needy and poor students. Every year many students benefit from this scheme. Library Orientation Programmes and Library Seminars are organized at regular intervals for the awareness of our users. Book Exhibitions are held annually for students and faculties to enlighten them academically and to facilitate their research activities. Renowned publishers and distributers like S. Chand, PHI, Puthi Pustak, Pustak Bipani, Techno World, Parul Prakashani, New Age Publishing, Loknath Book Agency and so on install their book stalls in the exhibition. A refurbished students' cheap store has books and accessories for students, available at a discount. Students and teachers have quick and easy access to photocopy facilities available in the library and office.
- Each Department has a Seminar Library, which caters to the immediate academic needs of the students. The departmental seminar libraries have a total of 3112 books in stock for lending out to the students. The seminar libraries maintain their respective registers to keep track of the books being lent to and received from the students.
- We have a reading room for students on the second floor of the college building, where students can go through and brood over books and journals amid an academically productive ambience of silence and quietude.

• Teachers of our college have substantially contributed to the academic archive of the college library by writing/editing/translating varied books/journals, thereby creating an intellectually vibrant and stimulating culture in the college. Response:

Basanti Devi College has consistently updated its IT infrastructure to meet evolving requirements. Since 2012, the college has seen significant enhancements in this regard. A separate broadband connection was provided to the college library for automation and remote library database sharing, with an initial internet speed of 8 Mbps and a data cap of 20 GB per month at high speed (beyond which the speed was reduced to 512 Kbps). In November 2017, the broadband plan for the library was upgraded to 24 Mbps.

The college is dedicated to maintaining top-tier IT infrastructure and application development to support both academic and administrative functions. The campus boasts Wi-Fi connectivity with a maximum bandwidth of 300 Mbps available 24/7, and the entire campus is monitored by CCTV surveillance.

Our fully air-conditioned auditorium can accommodate approximately 200 students. It is equipped with an interactive panel, digital surround speakers, cordless and desk microphones, a dedicated optical fiber internet connection, and Wi-Fi access. This space is regularly used for certificate courses, training sessions, workshops, and seminars.

Two gallery rooms, each with a capacity of 150 students, are fully equipped with short-throw digital projectors and an audio-visual system. Additionally, we have a smart classroom featuring a high-end interactive digital board, a desktop computer, a public address system, and Wi-Fi. The meeting room is outfitted with a portable projector and an automatic motorized screen.

The institution supports six ICT-enabled classrooms in the undergraduate section and two in the postgraduate section. These classrooms are essential for meeting the diverse academic needs of students and ensuring the smooth conduct of the teaching-learning process. They are equipped with portable

projectors, making them suitable for seminars and presentations.

The Teachers' Council and Academic Sub-Committee meet regularly to discuss and further implement important decisions regarding academic and co-curricular activities of the college. Moreover, under the guidance and leadership of IQAC, all Faculty members actively participate in designing and implementing the strategic action plans, as well as maintain an eco-friendly green and clean college campus.

• The college encourages and follows the culture of decentralization and participative management by involving all staff members in a number of administrative roles. The decision-making apex body at the college level is the Governing Body (GB) of the college. The GB has representatives from various stakeholders such as Government, University, and Society, Teaching staff, Administrative staff and the Students. The participative management is achieved by decentralization from GB through Principal, Coordinator, IQAC, and Heads of the Departments, teaching faculty and non-teaching staff. Before the commencement of every academic year, various college sub committees by the principal as per recommendations of IQAC. Committees comprise of teachers, non-teaching staff members and students. Some committees are statutory; Academic, Finance as per CU statute (1979), and the rest are formed for good governance (Grievance Redressal Committee, Internal Complaints Committee, SC-ST and Minority and OBC). IQAC plays an important role in monitoring the academic and administrative activities. The regular activities of the college are carried out through various committees like admission, academic, routine, examination, finance, purchase, and library, student's aid-fund etc. Report of every activity is prepared by each committee and placed before the Principal for suggestions and necessary actions.

6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment

6.2.1

Response:

The organizational structure of the institute has been functioning and deploying services as per statutes of the University of Calcutta and rules and regulations of the Department of Higher Education, Govt. of West Bengal.

The Governing Body of the college, with the Principal as the secretary and representatives from Teaching and Non-teaching staff, students and external members is responsible for the management of the college in compliance with the opinion of the majority of the members. All major decisions on academic affairs, admission, financial management, infrastructure, governance, and administration are taken by the Governing Body in compliance with recommendations and suggestions of IQAC and various statutory and non-statutory subcommittees like Finance Committee, Purchase Committee, Academic Sub-Committee, Service Book Committee etc.

The procedure of all appointments and service is maintained as per the norms of the Department of Higher Education, Government of West Bengal and the West Bengal College Service Commission. 32 State-Aided College Teachers were appointed in the session 2019-2020.

Perspective Plan (RUSA): One of the important institutional strategic/perspective plans which were effectively implemented is Rashtriya Ucchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA). The RUSA authority has

sanctioned Rs. 2.00 Crores for the college. This fund has been utilized for the creation of new facilities, for the renovation/upgradation of existing facilities, and for the procurement of state-of-the-art equipment/facilities.

The IQAC, under the guidance of the Principal, framed the strategy objectives to be attended considering the Vision and Mission of the college, SWOC analysis, stakeholders expectations and NAAC 3rd Cycle Peer Team recommendations. Some of the strategy plans along with the deployment are given below

- Teachers are eligible to obtain the benefits of Group Insurance Scheme.
- Provident fund loan facility is available to teachers in substantive posts, according to Govt. regulations.
- Interest free ad- hoc payment against salaries is provided to the newly appointed Faculty member in substantive posts.
- Financial support is extended for participation in Workshops and Conferences.

Welfare measures for Non-Teaching Staff (NTS)

- Casual leave, earned leave, Medical Leave are applicable as per Government norms.
- Maternity Leave & Child Care Leave (CCL) are given to the female Non teaching staff as per Government norms. Paternity leave is also available for the male staff.
- All non-teaching staff (substantive posts) of the college can draw festival advance from the college fund in the last quarter of every year. It is subsequently adjusted from their salary in 10 equal instalments.
- Interest free and ad hoc payment against salaries is provided to the newly appointed NTS in substantive posts before their pay fixation is done and regular salary is processed.
- Provident fund loan facilities (interest free) are provided to NTS in substantive posts, according to Govt. regulations.
- NTS are eligible to obtain the benefits of Group Insurance Scheme (who joined in a substantive post before 2016)
- Pension, General provident Fund, Gratuity, leave encashment etc. after retirements are given as per Government norms.

2. Objectives of the Practice:

- To know our students comprehensively with special reference to their family background which enables the institution to identify the specific needs and challenges of the students.
- To assess the Academic, Knowledge & Intelligence scores in order to find out the General Quotient (GQ)' of each student.
- To assess the different types of abilities like propensity to accept task, communicate, think & use tools in order to find out the Empowerment Quotient (EQ)' of the individual Student.

3. The Context:

Students often face diverse challenges with respect to their skill attributes. Some students may belong to economically backward families and have access to limited resources; some may be academically advance or slow irrespective of their economic status; others may have different Social, Emotional and Behavioural Skills. A systematic assessment of these attributes of the students may help in

providing an insight into their strengths and weaknesses. The profile mapping exercise enables the institution to identify the students' strengths and overcome their weaknesses.

4. The Practice:

- Students need to login with their login ID and password and answer an online questionnaire.
- Scores on 'General Quotient (GQ)' and 'Empowerment Quotient (EQ)' are calculated on the basis of the answers provided.
- The General Quotient comprises of Academic score, Intelligence score and Knowledge score.
- The Empowerment Quotient assesses different types of abilities. It also makes a comparison of the particular student in comparison with his/her peer group.
- Finally, a weighted average of GQ and EQ gives the final score, which represents the capability of the student.

5. Evidence of Success:

- This profile mapping report is utilized as an indicator by the department to identify advance and slow learners.
- Before organizing remedial classes for slow learners, the faculty checks the mapping along with the results of CIE (Continuous Internal Evaluation and guide accordingly to enhance the learning outcome of the slow learners.
- The students are channelized in different Certificate programmes, workshops, co-curricular

- activities following the mapping report.
- The institution also conducts a thorough analysis of the profile mapping before conducting the orientation programme for the 1st semester students.
- The student profile mapping helps the faculty members to intervene and improve the overall development of the students and prohibit students drop-out through interactive counseling sessions with students and parent teacher meetings as per requirement.

6. Problems Encountered & Resources Required:

- Inadequate digital knowledge, instable internet facility, inadequate time, poor knowledge in English imposes serious challenges in collecting data from the students.
